cousin



- 2. Become emotional, feel pleased, e.g. He was touched by the gift I gave him.



trouble

▶noun

- 1. In a distressful or dangerous situation, e.g. Don't eat all the biscuits, otherwise you will be in trouble when mum gets home; Take a sweater, otherwise you will be in trouble if it gets cold.
- 2. To take pains to do something, e.g. Don't go to the trouble of cooking anything, we are not hungry.


• To be anxious or worried, *e.g.* You are looking troubled, is there something wrong?

• An illness where one coughs a lot, e.g. He has a cold and a cough.



rough

▶adjective

- 1. Not smooth; uneven, e.g. After I shaved my head, it felt rough.
- 2. Approximate, e.g. Please give a rough estimate of how much it will cost.
- 3. Difficult; trying, e.g. I had a rough day today; I had a rough time trying to hear the teacher.
- 4. Violent; not careful or subtle e.g. This box has been through some rough handling; He hangs around with a rough crowd; They are not polite, the are very rough.

tough

▶adjective

- 1) Rugged or physically hardy, e.g. Spiderman is so tough that no one can kill him; Only tough people can live in the
- 2) Strong and resilient; sturdy, e.g. The tent is made of tough material.
- 3) Stubborn or strict, e.g. This teacher is too tough on the kids.



enough

▶adverb

Sufficient; all that is required, needed, or appropriate, e.g. I've already had enough sweets today; Don't fill the glass any more, that is enough.

laugh


▶verb (laugh, laughing, laughed)

To make chuckling sounds from the chest and throat, e.g. Wasn't it funny? You didn't laugh; Please stop laughing!

key

noun

An object designed to open and close a lock, e.g. *This is the key to my house.*





valley

▶noun

The lower land between two mountains, e.g. There is a river in the valley.





A narrow street,

e. g The kids were playing cricket in the alley.





donkey ▶noun

• A domestic animal similar to a horse,

e.g. I can see a donkey eating grass; Donkeys make a hee- haw sound.

cockney

▶noun

• A native of parts of the east end of London, England, *e.g. He has a cockney accent*.



jockey

>noun

 A person who rides racehorses, e.g. He was a jockey in the race; When I grow up, I want to be a jockey.



turkey

▶noun

• A bird like a chicken, e.g. Wild turkeys are found in *America*.

▶proper noun (Turkey)

• A Country in Europe, e.g. This is the flag of Turkey; Turkey is a Muslim country.





chimney ▶noun

• A vertical tube used to emit smoke or gas, e.g. There was smoke coming out of the factory's chimneys.

▶adjective

• Having a gray colour, the colour of smoke, e.g. *There are big gray clouds in the sky, I think it will rain; Elephants are gray.*

obey

▶verb [obey, obeying, obeyed]

• To do as ordered, e.g. She had to obey her teacher; Please obey the school rules.



prey

▶verb [prey, preying, preyed]

• An animal that is hunted by a bigger animal e.g. Mice are prey for cats.

hey

▶interjection

 An exclamation to get attention, e. g. He waved and said, "Hey!" Hey, look at this!



when

▶adverb

• Used to introduce questions about time. *e. g. When will they arrive? When they arrive.*

convey

▶verb [convey, conveying, conveyed]

• To communicate; to make known; to tell, e.g. "I conveyed the message to him."

different

▶adjective

• Not the same; exhibiting a difference, e.g. In the picture, the two trucks are the same but the car is different; Donkeys are different from horses.



president ▶noun

• The head of state of a republic, e.g. Sonia Gandhi is the former president of India.

resident

noun

• A person who lives in a particular area; a local, e.g. I am a resident of Vrindavan.

noun


• A worm that eats leaves and fruit, e.g. The bird just ate a green caterpillar.



1. Able but not certain to happen; not impossible, *e. g.* Rain tomorrow is possible, but I wouldn't bet on it; It's not just possible, it's probable.

2. Suitable or doable, e.g. Would it be possible for you to speak a little softer? Would it be possible for you to come to school on time?

terrible

▶adjective

- 1) Intense; extreme in degree or extent, e.g. He is in terrible trouble for telling lies.
- 2) Unpleasant; disagreeable, bad, e. g. The food was terrible, but it was free; That medicine tastes terrible! He is a terrible driver; I am terrible at maths!



please

▶verb [please, pleasing, pleased]

• To make happy or satisfy; to give pleasure, *e. g Her presentation pleased the teacher*.

▶adverb

• Used to make a polite request, e.g. Please, pass the bread; The teacher said to the students, "Please do not talk out of turn".



leave

▶verb [leave, leaving, left]

- 1. Depart, e.g. What time does the bus leave? What time should I leave home so that I arrive on time.
- 2. To not use all, e. g. Did you leave any rice for us? The ants did not leave even a crumb of bread.
- 3. To stop coming, e.g. When did you decide to leave school?

►noun

 Holiday, e.g. I need to take one day's leave from

school; How many days leave do we get per year?



▶noun

A small animal with a

tail, e.g. He has a pet mouse; A mouse came into my house last night and bit my toe.



▶noun

- 1) The number 1 card in a deck of cards, e.g. I won the game because I got four aces.
- 2) An expert at something, e.g. He's an ace at cricket!
- 3) (in tennis) To serve a ball that your opponent cannot return, e.g. I scored an ace and won the match.



• To cut a piece off, e.g. He sliced off his finger with an knife.





twice

▶adverb

- 1) Two times, e.g. I rang you twice.
- 2) double, e.g. Twice two is four; He sold it to me for twice the price (It should have been Rs10, but he gave it to me for Rs20!)

▶noun

• An opinion about what to do, e.g. According to the doctor's advice, he has stopped eating sugary foods.

once

▶adverb

• Only one time, e.g. I have only eaten pizza once; I have seen you once before; Once upon a time....

one

▶noun

• The number 1, e.g. I only have one friend.

none

▶adjective

• Not one, zero, e. g None of the people I invited to my birthday party came.

done

▶verb (past tense of do)

• Finished, e.g. He has done his homework but I am still doing mine; Have you done your homework?

dance

▶verb [dance, dancing, danced, has danced]

• Moving to music, e.g. I am dancing; Show me how to dance; I love to dance; Do you know how to dance?



• A boundary or wall around land, e.g. There was a fence around the house; There is a fence around our school.

▶adverb

• From that time, e.g. They left town and haven't visited since.

▶preposition

• Continuously from, e.g. They have been friends since childhood.

▶conjunction

- 1. During the period subsequent to the time when, e.g. He hasn't been home since he graduated.
- 2. Because, e.g. Since you're not interested, I won't tell you about it.





ounce

▶noun

• A weight of measure equal to 28 grams, e.g. To make a chocolate cake, add one ounce of chocolate to the cake mix.



bounce

▶verb [bounce, bouncing, bounces, bounced]

• To move quickly up and then down, e.g. Please do not bounce the ball in class; There is no air in this ball, it does not bounce.



announce

▶verb [announce, announces, announcing, announced]

• To make known for the first time, e.g. The arrival of the president was announced on the

news; At school assembly, the principal announced that tomorrow is a holiday.



balance

▶noun

• A state where both sides are equal, e.g. This is a balance scale.

▶verb [balance, balances, balancing, balanced]


Not falling, e.g. Try to balance a book on your head.

distance

noun

• The amount of space between two points, e.g. The distance from Vrindavan to Mathura is around 10 kilometers; We can use a map to measure the distance from one place to another.

▶noun


• A meaningful group of words that begins with a capital letter and ends with a full stop, *e.g.* The children were making sentences using the words from the vocabulary list.

A unit of money (usually 100 per dollar), *e.g. This is a*


one cent coin belonging to the Euro currency which is used in Europe; He spent every last cent; Do you have a 1 cent coin?

• A liquid that burns things, e. g. We have to be very careful when using acid in the science lab.






circus

pencil

▶noun

• A writing tool, e.g. She wrote with a pencil.

▶noun
