## **Swing in the Monsoon**

#### move

## ▶verb [move, moving, moved]

- To pass from one place or position to another, e.g. Please move your head so that I can see the television; Do not move, stay here! If you keep moving, I cannot take the photo; Please move closer together.
- To change the place where you live, e.g. Her family are moving to a new house; Do you plan to move into this neighbourhood?



#### remove

## ▶verb [remove, removing, removed]

• To take away or take off, e.g. Please remove the plates from the table; Please remove your shoes before entering the temple.

#### lose

## ▶verb [lose, losing, lost]

- 1) To come to be without something that you had before, *e.g. I* think *I* lost my hat; Put your keys in your bag, otherwise you will lose them.
- 2) Opposite of win, e.g. Run fast, otherwise you will lose the race.

## whose

## **▶**pronoun

• Belonging to whom, e.g. Whose umbrella is this?

## door

#### **▶**noun

An entrance of a house or cupboard, e.g. He opened the door of the house.

#### floor

#### **▶**noun

• The ground inside buildings, e.g. This is a wooden floor; Don't sit on the floor, put a mat down.

#### broad

## ▶adverb, adjective

• Of great breadth, e.g. He has broad shoulders.



#### breeze

#### **▶**noun

• A light wind, e.g. The breeze came through the window and cooled everyone down.

#### freeze

## ▶verb [freeze, freezing, froze, has frozen]

- When water becomes ice, e.g. Do not put the drinks in the freezer for too long, otherwise they will freeze.
- To suddenly stop moving, e.g. The police officer shouted, "Freeze!"

#### sneeze

## ▶verb [sneeze, sneezing, sneezed]

• A sudden release of air from one's nose due to irritation or sickness, *e.g. He had a cold and was sneezing a lot*.

#### **▶**noun

• an act or the sound of releasing air from the nose, e.g. She stopped a sudden sneeze from happening by saying 'watermelon'.





## squeeze

## ▶verb [squeeze, squeezing, squeezed]

• To press together; compress, e.g. She squeezed the

oranges to make juice.



#### ▶noun

• Food made from the pressed curds of milk, *e.g. She loved eating cheese sandwiches*.



#### geese

#### **▶**noun

• A plural of 'goose', a big duck, e.g. You can see geese swimming in the pond at Kushuram Sarobarah in Goverdhan.



#### loose

## **▶**adjective

• Not tight, e.g. *Tie your shoe laces tighter, your shoes are too loose.* 

#### choose

## ▶verb [choose, choosing, chose, has chosen]

• To select one from many, e.g. You have to choose whether to study English or Sanskrit; Have you chosen which school you want to go to? I am having trouble choosing what to wear.



#### else

#### **▶**adverb

• Other things; besides; in addition, e.g. What else are you doing today? What else would you like?

#### sense

#### **▶**noun

- 1. The five faculties of knowing (sight, hearing, smell, taste, or touch), *e.g. I have a good sense of smell*.
- 2. Intelligence, e.g. I hope he has the sense to look both ways before crossing the road; What is the sense in going out when it is about to rain?



#### tense

#### **▶**adjective

• Taking tension; stretched tight or rigid e.g. He was a tense person, he was always taking tension about one thing or another.

#### **▶**noun

• The form of a verb, e.g. The past tense of 'lose' is 'lost'.

## ▶verb [tense, tensing, tensed]

• To become rigid, worried or tense through anxiety or nervousness, *e.g.* Her body tensed up as the man yelled at her.

#### balloon

#### **▶**noun

• A toy that is blown up with air, e.g. Can you please blow up this balloon for me?

#### too

#### **▶**adverb

• Also, e.g. Rohit was sitting on the bench and Sandeep was sitting on the bench too.



#### soon

#### **▶**adverb

• In a short time, not long, e.g. It is already 6 o'clock, the bus should come soon! Just wait here, I will be back soon; The bell will ring soon.

#### boot

#### **▶**noun

• A long shoe, e.g. He put on his boots.



#### flood

#### ▶noun

 Water that comes on land after rain, e.g. There was a flood in the city.

# ►verb [flood, flooding, flooded]

• To cover or submerge in water, e.g. The Yamuna flooded and water came onto the Parikrama Marg; If you don't turn the tap off, you will flood the bathroom.

## scoop

#### ▶noun

A big spoon used for taking out ice-cream, flour (etc), e.g.
This is an icecream scoop; Can you give me one more scoop of icecream?

## ▶verb [scoop, scooping, scooped]

• To use a scoop to take something out, e.g. He scooped the wheat out of the big drum, into the small bucket.



• A tool for eating, e.g. She used her spoon to

drink her dahl.



## noon

#### **▶**noun

Midday, e.g. They had lunch at noon.

#### moon

#### **▶**noun

• The biggest ball of light seen in the night sky, *e.g. The moon was full and bright*.
