calf ▶noun

• The young baby of a cow, *e.g.* The *new calf was born*.





half ▶adjective

• One of two equal parts of a whole, *e.g. I took half the cake; He gave me half the apple.*



▶noun

• A large fish that lives in both freshwater rivers and the ocean, *e.g. The fisherman caught a large salmon; The salmon were swimming in the river;*



often

▶adverb

• Many times, frequently, *e.g. He visits his parents as often as he can; Do you often visit Vrindavan? He is is often late.*

soften

▶verb

• To make soft (not hard), e.g. Use this oil to soften your hair.



fasten ▶adjective

• To attach safely and tightly, *e.g. She fastened her seatbelt; Please fasten the bags onto the roof of the car with this rope.*



moisten ▶verb

• To make slightly wet or damp, *e.g. She moistened her lips by licking them.*



castle

noun

• An old palace where a king or queen lives, *e.g. He went to visit the castle.*

whistle

►verb [whistle, whistling, whistled]

To make a clear musical sound by blowing air through the lips, e.g. He whistled the tune of 'Govindam Adi Purusam'.

▶noun

• An object that is blown to make a loud sound, e.g. The guard blew the whistle to keep the crowd moving; In sports, the coach blows a whistle at the beginning of the match.



Christmas

noun

The biggest festival of the Christian church. It celebrates the birth of Jesus on the 25th December, e.g. We have a holiday for Christmas Day.

chestnut

▶noun

The round nut that comes from a chestnut tree, • similar to peanuts but sweeter, *e.g.* The chestnuts fell from the tree.

debt ('b' is silent, rhymes with 'pet') ▶ noun

Krishna by spreading His holy name.

Something that is owed after borrowing, e.g. She had a debt of 50 rupees to the shop; I do not want to borrow money because I don't like to be in debt; We should try to repay our debt to

subtle

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▶adjective

Fine, or delicate in meaning, not obvious, e.g. The taste of milk is very subtle, it does not ٠ have a strong taste; As well as our gross bodies, we also have subtle bodies.



wednesday

▶noun

The fourth day of the week, following Tuesday, *e.g. Every* Wednesday they had a dance class; Are you free on Wednesday?

handsome

▶adjective

Attractive (for men), e.g. He looked handsome in the suit; Sri • Krishna is the most handsome; I want to marry a handsome man.





handkerchief

noun

• A small piece of cloth used for wiping one's nose, eyes, face etc, *e.g. He blew his nose on the handkerchief*.

scene ('c' is silent. Sounds the same as 'seen') ▶noun

- 1. The place where some action or event occurs, *e.g. He returned to the scene of the crime.*
- 2. One part of a drama, *e.g. This drama has* 4 *scenes; This is scene* 1.

scissors ('c' is silent)

noun

• A cutting instrument for paper, cloth etc, *e.g. She used the scissors to cut the string.*





raspberry

▶noun

• A small red berry, *e.g. She made a raspberry pie; Do you like raspberry jam?*

gnome ('g' is silent) ▶noun

• A magical figure from stories considered to be lucky, *e.g. He had a gnome in his garden.*



gnat ('g' is silent) ▶noun

• A small fly, e.g. There were gnats in her room; If you go near the river, the gnats will bite you.



gnaw ('g' is silent)

►verb [gnaw, gnawing, gnawed]

• To bite or chew on for a long time, *e.g. The dog gnawed the shoe.*





gnarl ('g' is silent) ▶adjective

• A twist on a tree branch, *e.g. The tree was old and gnarled*

noun

- 1. A vertical row or list, *e.g. This table has three columns and four rows.*
- 2. A pole used to support a building, *e.g. Narashringa Dev came out of a column.*

honest

▶adjective

• Someone who doesn't tell lies or steal, *e.g. She is an honest person; We don't like dishonest people; Sri Ram showed us how to be honest, because he went to the forest so that his father would be able to keep his promise.*

hour

▶noun

A period of time equal to 60 minutes, e.g. He slept for an hour.

rhyme

▶noun

• Words that have the same ending, *e.g. Cat rhymes with bat; Can you think of any words that rhyme with hour? (sour)*



rhythm

noun

• The beat of a song or poem, *e.g. He was moving his body to the rhythm of the music.*

wrap

►verb [wrap, wrapping, wrapped]

• To cover something, e.g. *He wrapped the Christmas gifts; Please wrap your books in plastic.*

wren

▶noun

• A small songbird, *e.g. The wrens were sitting in the tree.*



write ▶verb [write, writing, wrote, written]

• To use a pen or pencil to make letters, *e.g.* Write

your name on the board; Do you know how to write your name in English?

whole

▶adjective

• Total, complete, *e.g. The cake is not whole, one piece is missing; He ate the whole cake; Please put your whole-hearted effort into your studies.*



sword

noun

A weapon; a large knife with blades on both sides, e.g. He lifted up the sword.

answer

▶noun

• A spoken or written reply or response to a question, *e.g. He answered the question.*







limb ('b' is silent) noun

> Legs and arms, *e.g.* These are ٠ artificial limbs; All her limbs hurt from climbing up the mountain.

hair, e.g.

Could you please lend me your comb?

- verb [comb, combing, combed]
- To use a comb to untangle the hair, e.g. She sat in the sun and combed the knots out of her hair; Could you please comb my hair for me?

crumb ('b' is silent) noun



• A small piece of food, e.g. The crumbs fell off the biscuits; Do not spill any crumbs on the floor, otherwise ants will come to eat them.

thumb ('b' is silent) noun

• The short, fat finger on the hand, e.g. He stuck his thumb up in agreement; I have a sore thumb.



lamb ('b' is silent)

- noun
 - A baby sheep, e.g. The lambs were in the field. •

dump

▶verb [dump, dumping, dumped]

• To drop or throw away, e.g. Dump your rubbish in the rubbish bin; Dumping rubbish on the street is against the law.

▶noun

• A place where rubbish has collected, *e.g. The empty land behind my house has become a rubbish dump.*

numb ('b' is silent)

▶verb [numb, numbing, numbed]

• Having no feeling, *e.g.* Her fingers were numb from the cold; I fell asleep using my hand as a pillow and now is has become numb.

climb ('b' is silent)

►verb [climb. climbing, climbed]

• To move upwards, *e.g.* The electrician climbed up the ladder to fix the wires; Monkeys like to climb trees; I had to climb up five flights of stairs.





island ▶noun

• A piece of land completely surrounded by water, *e.g. She went to the Island by boat.*

autumn

noun

• The season between summer and winter, *e.g. In Autumn, leaves fall off the trees.*



noun

• A person who serves in an army, a person engaged in military service, *e.g. He was a solider in the army.*



two

▶noun/adjective

• A cardinal number, 1 + 1, *e.g.* There *are two girls waiting at your door.*

heart

▶noun

• The organ in our bodies that pumps blood, e.g. If you put your head on the chest of your friend, you can hear the sound of her heart beating; His heart was beating quickly
