apricot

▶ noun

• An orange fruit, sometimes eaten dry, e.g. "I like eating apricots in the morning"





lady

▶ noun

• A woman; a woman who is polite and well spoken, e.g. *She maybe poor and have little education, but she's a real lady.*



baby

▶ noun

• An infant or young child/animal, e.g. Sarah had a baby boy.

crazy

adjective

- 1. Insane, mad, e.g. *Don't believe* what he says, he is a little crazy.
- 2. Mad about, a fan or enthusiast, e.g. He is crazy about Cricket, he watches every match.



lazy

➤ adjective

• A person who dislikes work and sleeps a lot,

e.g. He is so lazy, he never does his homework.



bagel

▶ noun

• A bun with a hole in the middle, e.g. I love bagels and cream cheese.





angel

• noun

- 1. A messenger of God, e.g. A beautiful angel appeared on earth.
- 2. A well behaved or helpful person, e.g. Thank you so much, you are an angel; These girls are not not naughty, they are little angels.

danger

Possibility of harm or injury, e.g. "Tigers are in danger of becoming extinct; There is danger everywhere, even crossing the road is dangerous; Do not go near the edge, there a danger of falling.



apron

▶ noun

• A special dress worn while cooking or doing dirty work, e.g. Where an apron while you fry the samosas, otherwise your clothes might get dirty.

bacon

▶ noun

Meat from the leg of a pig. Usually sliced thin and fried for food, e.g. She hated the smell of bacon.

acorn

▶ noun

A hard nut that is found on Oak trees, e.g. When I was walking underneath the tree, an acorn fell on my head; Squirrels eat acorns, Acorns are the seeds of Oak trees.





able

▶ noun

• Having necessary skill to do something, e.g. She cannot see but still she is able to do most things; I was not able to fix the t.v; I was not able to finish my homework in time.

▶ adjective

• Having abilities, being able to do many things, e.g. Don't worry, he is a very able man, he will fix it.

table

▶noun

• An article of furniture used for writing, eating, etc, *e.g. I left the book on the kitchen table*.



stable

• noun

• A building where horses or cows live; a barn, e.g. Put the horses into the stable, it is about to rain.



cradle

noun

• A small bed for an infant, e.g. Yashoda kept baby Krishna in a cradle.

flavour

▶ noun (American - flavor)

• Taste from food or drink, e.g. Which flavour would you like – Mango, Vanilla or Chocolate?

aviator

▶ noun

• The pilot of an airplane or helicopter, *e.g. Her Dad is an aviator.*



alligator

noun

 A large animal like a crocodile but less dangerous, e.g.
Crocodiles eat people but alligators do not.





radiator

▶ noun

 An oil heater, e.g. We always have the radiator on during winter.

station

noun

1. A place where things usually are, e.g. The police

are in the police station; The buses are at the bus station.

2. A stopping place for trains or buses, e.g. *You* should catch the train from New Delhi Station.



nation

▶ noun

• Country, e.g. 'The president spoke to the nation about the next tax"








calm

- adjective
 - Still or peaceful, e.g. Sarah remained calm during the fire; The sea is calm today; After chanting Hare Krishna, he felt calm.

balm

- **▶** noun
 - A cream for wounds, burns, etc, e.g. *Please* put on some lip balm.



palm

- noun
 - The inside of the hand, from the wrist to the bases of the fingers, e.g. The astrologer looked at the palm of her hand and told her that she would have 3 babies.



father

- **▶** noun
 - A male parent, e.g. Mohit looks like his father.





almond

noun

• A type of nut (dry fruit), e.g. "I love almonds!"

drama

▶ noun

- 1. A play, e.g. The drama on the stage was nice.
- 2. A fuss over nothing, e.g. Don't make drama, just do your homework quietly.



rather


▶ adverb

• Prefer, e.g. Would you rather eat an orange or an apple? I would rather go to school than go to work.

low

▶ adjective

• Not far above the ground; opposite of high, *e.g. One flag is low, the other is high.*



below

▶ adverb

• In our toward a lower place, e.g. The cars are below the building; She lives in the apartment below mine.





tow

▶ verb [tow, towing, towed]

• To pull or haul by a rope, chain or other device, *e.g. The car was towing the boat.*



bow

noun

• A fancy knot, e.g. Tie the ribbon into a bow.







row

▶ noun

• Things arranged in a line, *e.g.* We sit in the back row of the classroom; We have three rows of apple trees in our orchard.

▶ verb [row, rowing, rowed]

• To use two sticks to move a boat, e.g. The men are rowing the boat. Do you know how to row a boat? Have you ever rowed a boat?

rowing

▶ verb

- To propel a vessel by using two oars (wooden paddles), e.g. I like going rowing; Rowing is an Olympic sport.
 - ➤ verb (see 'row' above)



grow

▶ noun

- 1. The increase in size of animals and plants, *e.g. Eat your spinach, it will help you grow.*
- 2. Cultivate, e.g. What are you growing in your garden? I am growing vegetables.



▶ noun

• White rain, made of tiny pieces of ice, *e.g. The snow was falling heavily.*



glow

noun

• A soft light, e.g. The lights were glowing; Her face was glowing.



bowl

▶ noun

A deep round dish or basin, used for eating soup, cereal etc. *e.g.* She had cereal in a bowl for breakfast.



show

▶ verb [show, showing, shown]

• To cause or allow to be seen, exhibit, display, e.g. Let me show you my house.

▶ noun

• A performance, e.g. Did you see that television show? We are going to see a puppet show.

slow

▶ adjective

• Not fast, less speed than usual, e.g. This is such a slow train; This is a very slow internet connection.

window

▶ noun

• An opening in the wall of a building, the side of a vehicle, *e.g.* Can you open the window please?





throw

• noun

• To make something fly from your hand, e.g. Did you throw a ball? Please throw me the pencil.

fellow

noun

- 1. A man or boy, e.g. He's a nice fellow
- 2. A companion, associate, e.g. He is my fellow mountain climber.

yellow

- **▶** adjective
 - A color, e.g. My favorite color is yellow; Bananas are yellow.

shadow

- noun
 - A dark figure caused by the sun being blocked, *e.g. I* saw his shadow on the wall, Lets go outside and look at our shadows.





meadow ➤ noun

• Grassland, e.g. We walked across the meadow.

know

verb [know, knowing, known]

• To perceive or understand as fact or

truth, e.g. I know that you told him; Do you know his address?

known

- **▶** verb
 - To know something, e.g. She is well known in this area; Her plan is unknown.
- **▶** adjective
 - Recognized, familiar, e.g. This was the only known case of typhoid in the village.



knee

▶ noun

• The joint in the middle of the leg, e.g. She hurt her knee.

knife

- ▶ noun (plural knives)
 - An instrument for cutting, e.g. Please cut these carrots with that knife.



knock

▶ verb

• To strike a sounding blow with the fist especially on a door, window, e.g. Please knock on the door before entering.



more

adjective

• In grater quantity; the opposite of less, e.g. I need more money! He has more money than me; Which pile of coins has more coins?



sore

▶ adjective

Physically painful, e.g. She has a sore shoulder; I have a sore hand so I cannot write.

▶ noun

• a raw or painful place on the body, e.g. I have a sore on my knee from when I fell off my bike.



tore

➤ verb [tear, tearing, tore]

• Simple past of 'tear'; to pull apart; to rip, e.g. She tore the papers; My baby tore my photo in half; Oh, No! She has torn my homework.

wore

verb [wear, wearing, wore]

• Simple past of 'wear'; to carry or have on the body or about the person as a covering, equipment, ornament. e.g. These are the clothes my family wore yesterday, I will wash them today; She wore a coat last night.



shore

noun

• The land along the edge of a sea, lake, river etc, e.g. The tree in the photo is growing on the shore of the river; Stay on the shore, do not go into the water.





store

▶ noun

• An business where goods are sold, e.g. I love going to the grocery store; Can you go to the store and buy some sugar?






before

▶ preposition

• Previous to, earlier or sooner than, e.g. The first photo is before I put make-up on. Phone me before noon; Have you seen him before or is this the first time?



action

▶ noun

- 1. Movement, activity, e.g. We have many places to go so it is sure to be an action packed trip! There is no use to just sit here and complain, lets take some action; I like to watch the action in <u>Tom and Jerry</u>.
- 2. A movie where there are many fight scenes, e.g. Salman Khan plays the hero in many action movies; I want to see an action movie.

fiction

adjective

• The class of literature comprising works of imaginative narration, especially in prose

form, e.g. "Sita Sat at The Temple" is a fiction book but "King Bharat is a Deer" is non-fiction.

position

noun

• The place of something, e.g. Please remain in one position, do not move around; I learnt the lotus position in Yoga class today.

mention

▶ verb [mention, mentioning, mentioned]

• To refer to briefly, e.g. Don't forget to mention her name to the boss; He keeps mentioning that he is hungry.

caption

noun

• A or explanation for a picture or illustration, especially in a magazine, e.g. I like to write captions underneath my photos so that I can remember where the photo was taken; There was a funny caption in the newspaper.





friction

▶ noun

• The heat or sound caused when two things rub together, e.g. The heat caused by the friction of rubbing two sticks together can be used to make fire; Cycles need to be oiled, otherwise they get slowed down by friction; If you rub your hands together, they feel warm, that is because of friction.

invention

▶ noun

• Something new that someone has thought of, e.g. The invention of solar panels to make electricity using the sun has been very useful.



question

▶ noun

• Addressed to someone in order to get information in reply, e.g. That is a good question; Did you see the questions she sent? These are your homework questions.

➤ verb [question, questioning, questioned]

• To ask a question, e.g. The teacher questioned us about why we were late.



sure

▶adverb

• To be certain, have no doubts, e.g. I was sure that I put my lunchbox here, but now I cant see it; Are you sure that you told him to come at 8 o'clock?

sugar

noun

• A sweet powder made from sugar cane, e.g. *I like sugar* in my tea.

insure

▶ verb [insure, insuring, insured]

• To guarantee against loss or harm, e.g. This insurance company insures jewellery. (If it is lost or stolen, they will give money to replace it)

▶adjective

• To have insurance cover, e.g. If your camera is insured, you will get the money back if it is stolen.

ensure

▶ verb [ensure, ensuring, ensured]

• To promise, e.g. You can leave your bag here but I can't ensure its safety.

assure

▶ verb [assure, assuring, assured]

• To declare earnestly to; to state with confidence, *e.g. She assured us that she would be here on time.*

special

▶ adjective

• Different from the others, e.g. This is a special kind of key.

official

▶ noun

• A person appointed or elected to an office, or charged with certain duties, e.g. She was an official at the embassy; I am the official class monitor.

social

▶ noun

• Having friendly relations; talkative, e.g. She was a member of a social tennis club; He is a very social person – he doesn't like to be alone.



artificial

▶ adjective

• Made by humans; not natural, e.g. Scientists are trying to create artificial intelligence; Toffees are artificial but fruit is natural.

facial

- **▶** adjective
 - 1. Of the face, e.g. Some men have facial hair.
 - 2. A beauty treatment, e.g. She has a facial every Sunday.





passion

▶ noun

Any powerful or compelling emotion or feeling, e.g. She played the violin with so much passion that it caught on fire because of the heat from the friction of the bow on the strings.

session

• noun

A meeting, e.g. Court is in session; He went to a counselling session but he was still upset.
