chap

noun

[rarely used] A man or boy, e.g. He is a nice chap.

chat

- ▶ verb (chat, chatting, past chatted)
 - To talk in a friendly way about unimportant things, e.g. We were chatting about the weather.



- **▶** noun
- 1. Any disk that spins, e.g. Krishna used his Sudarshan Chakra to kill Shishopal.
- 2. [in Yoga] Each of the centers of spiritual power in the human body, usually considered to be seven in number, e.g. The yogi was doing a meditation to open his kundalini chakra.
- 3. [from Hindi] a spinning wheel or disk, e.g. There is a chakra on the Indian flag.



Chakra


- ▶ proper noun
 - A person's name, an Indian surname, e.g. His name is Manish Chakra.

check

▶ noun

- 1. To make sure someone or something is okay, e.g. Can you check my homework? Sam is sick, I'll check on him later.
 - 2. A slip of paper that allows someone to get money from the bank (spelt 'cheque' in British English).
 - 3. A pattern made of squares of different colours (also checkered), e.g. Checkered flags are used in car racing; He is wearing a checked shirt.










chin

▶ noun

• The part of the body underneath the mouth, *e.g. I* have a pimple on my chin.







chip

- noun
 - 1. A small piece knocked out a bigger object, *e.g. Woodchips are used for making paper.*
 - 2. Fried slices of potato, e.g. Can you go to the shops and buy me a packet of chips?
 - 3. A part of a computer or phone, *e.g. Computer chips are very small*



chill

• noun

A light flu caused by cold weather, e.g. Don't go out in the rain, otherwise you will catch a chill.

verb (chill, chilling, past chilled)


- 1. To relax, e.g. Sit down for a while and chill.
- 2. To make cold, e.g. Did you chill the water?

▶ adjective (**chilled**)

• To be slightly cold, e.g. Please put the cola in the fridge, I want to drink it chilled.

chop

- ► verb (chop, chopping, past chopped)
 - To cut with something sharp, like an axe, knife, etc, e.g. Chop the tree with the axe; He chopped the carrots with a knife; He chopped off his finger with a knife.



chug

▶ verb

1. To consume a drink in large gulps without stopping, *e.g.* Stop chugging that drink, you will choke; He chugged down the whole bottle.

2. **[of an engine]** To move slowly with a rhythmic sound, *e.g. The tractor was chugging along; The train chugs into the station at around 4pm.*



chum

- **▶** noun
 - [rarely used] Friend, pal, e.g. She is my chum.

Shakti

- proper noun
 - 1. A person's name
 - 2. [from Hindi]

strength/power, e.g. We need some Krishna Shakti to help with this project.

shall

▶ noun

• [old fashioned, rarely used] Used to express something that is going to happen, something that must be done or to make suggestions. e.g. Shall we go now?

shed

▶ noun

• A building used for keeping things in, e.g. The cows are in the cow shed and the tools are in the tool shed.

▶ verb (**shed, shedding**, *past* **shed**)

 To cause to fall, come out, e.g. The dog is shedding hair.



shell

▶ noun

of some animals like tortoises, snails, sea snails, e.g. The pujari blew the conch shell to start the arati; I like to collect seashells at the beach.





ship


▶ noun

• A large boat, e.g. Srila Prabhupada went to America by ship.

shin

▶ noun

• The front part of the leg, from knee to ankle. Mostly refers to the bone you can feel between your knee and foot, e.g. I got hit on the shin by a cricket ball; Cricketers wear shin pads to protect their shins.



shop

▶ noun

• A place that sells things, e.g. I bought some rice at the ration shop.

▶verb (shops, shopping, past shopped)

• To go to a shop or shops to buy goods, e.g. Lets shop till we drop! I am shopping for a new bike.



shot

[past tense of shoot]

verb (shoot, shooting, past shot)

• To hit with a bullet or arrow, e.g. He shot a bird, He can shoot you with his gun; He shot me! Arjun shot an arrow at the eye of the bird.

noun

1. To be hit by a bullet, e.g. He got shot in the leg; He died after being shot by the police.

2. To hit a ball in a game such EMINEM

as cricket, tennis etc, e.g. He hit a good shot; He missed the shot.

3. Immunization, e.g. Has your baby had all the shots for Hepatitis? Have you had the flu shot?



shock

► verb (**shock, shocking**, *past* **shocked**)

• A feeling of surprise; disgust; fear, e.g. I was shocked at how late it was; I was shocked by the news of his death; The teacher was shocked at the children's behaviour.








shut

- ▶ verb (**shut**, **shutting**, *past* **shut**)
- To close or be closed, e.g. Please shut the door; The door is shut; The shop shuts at 5 o'clock.



that

- ▶ Determiner adjective, adverb, pronoun, determiner, conjunction
 - Indicating something, e.g. What is that? Who is that man? What is that thing in your hand?
- **▶** adjective
 - So, very, e.g. I can't run that much; I can't sleep that little.
- **▶** pronoun
 - *e.g. That is the boy who came.*
- **▶** conjunction
 - e.g. You said that you were coming; We saw that he was tired.

than

- **▶** conjunction
 - Used after the comparative, e.g. He is taller than me; I am fatter than him.

then

- **▶** adverb
 - Next, in the future, e.g. First eat, then play; He took a bath then went to his friend's house.

them

- **▶** pronoun
 - 3rd person plural, *e.g. The classroom belongs to them.*

this

- **▶** determiner
 - Indicating something, e.g. Who is this man? What is this?
 - **▶**adjective
 - Of the present time, e.g. I am going away this month.
 - **▶** pronoun
 - *e.g.* Whose is this? Who did this?
 - **▶** adverb
 - To this point, so, measuring something, e.g. The table is this big (speaker will use hand gesture to show); We walked this far in one hour (speaker will give a visual picture on a map etc)

thin

- **▶** adjective
 - 1. Skinny, not fat, e.g. She is a very thin woman.
- 2. The opposite of thick, e.g. I cannot read such a thick book, can you give me a thinner one?



tap

▶noun

Something water comes out of,

e.g. Turn on the tap and fill the glass with water.

▶verb (taps, tapping, past tapped)

1. To touch someone with a finger, e.g. He tapped me on the shou<mark>lder.</mark>

2. To lightly touch a foot to the ground, e.g. He was tapping his foot to the beat of the song.



zap

► verb (zap, zapping, past zapped)

• To destroy, kill, obliterate e.g. The insect was zapped by the electronic bug zapper.



tip ▶noun

1. The end of something,

e.g. I cut the tip of my finger; Touch you finger tips to the table; The tip of the pencil is very sharp.

2. Clue or advice, e.q. *Give me some tips on how to look after a baby.*

3. Extra money given for service, e.g. Give the boy a tip for carrying our bags; I gave the waiter a good tip.

►verb (**tips**, **tipping**, *past* **tipped**)

• To overbalance or cause to overbalance so as to fall or turn over *e.g.* He tipped over my pencil jar; be careful or you will tip the boat.

zip

▶ noun

A device made for easily closing

two clothes together, e.g. I have a zip on my sweate. Does your bag have a zip?

►verb (zips, zipping, past zipped)

e.g. Please zip up your jacket; It was cold so he zipped up his jacket.



pig

► noun

• An animal that is usually fat and eats a lot, *e.g.* The pig was eating the food scraps; The pig is sitting in the mud.




zigzag

▶ noun

• A line that goes from side to side, e.g. There is a zigzag pattern on my sweater

►verb (zigzag, zigzagging, zigzagged)

e.g. Please drive in a straight line, don't zigzag all over the road; He is zigzagging all over the road!

- ► Proper noun
 - A man's name



rich

- ▶ adjective
 - 1. Someone who has a lot of money, *e.g. Do you have any rich relatives?*
 - 2. Sweet food that is full of sugar and cream, e.g. We could only eat a small piece of cake as it was very rich.


much

- ▶ adjective or adverb (comparative **more**, superlative **most**)
 - 1. In a great quantity, degree, e.g. I can't eat that much; Does he have that much land? Thank you very much.
 - 2. To a higher level, more, e.g. This pile is much bigger than that one; This is much better; This is much longer; Today is much colder than yesterday.



such

- ▶ adjective, determiner, or pronoun
 - Really, e.g. This is such good food! He is such a good boy!



ash

▶ noun

• Gray dust left when something is burned, e.g. Shivji opened his third eye and burned Cupid into ashes.

cash

▶ noun

• Money; notes and coins, e.g. Do you have any cash with you? I have some money in the bank but I have no cash with me.



bash

- ▶ verb (bash, bashing, past bashed)
 - 1. To hit very hard, e.g. He bashed his brother in the head with a stick.
 - 2. A thorough beating, a good thrashing, e.g. He got bashed up in the playground



rash

▶ noun

• An outbreak of red marks or pimples in one area of skin, e.g. He has a rash on his arm; I get heat rash in summer; My baby has diaper rash.

▶ adjective

1. Careless, hasty, a decision without careful thought, e.g. He made a rash decision to leave school.



sash

▶ noun

 A big strip of cloth worn over the shoulders or around the waist, e.g. Krishna is wearing a sash; Miss Universe wears a sash.

wish

▶ noun

• Desire; hope, e.g. Look at the stars and make a wish; I wish you would stop talking!









dish

- **▶** noun
 - 1. A plate or container for food, e.g. Serve the pasta on a nice dish; Did you wash the dishes?
 - 2. Cooked food, e.g. We were served several dishes, some sweet, some savory.
- 3. A bowl shaped object for sending or receiving satellite beams, e.g. This is a satellite dish; Do you have a t.v dish at home?



fish

▶ noun

• An animal that lives in water and is able to breath under water, e.g. Fish live in rivers, ponds, oceans and lakes.



hush

- ► verb (hush, hushing, past hushed)
 - To become or make silent, e.g. Hush!Silent!; They hushed the crying children; Hush little baby, don't you cry, Daddy's going to buy you a mocking bird.
- ▶ noun
 - [hush hush] A secret, e.g. Don't tell anyone, it is all very hush hush.

rush

▶ noun

- Hurry, e.g. He was in a rush.
- ▶ verb (rush, rushing, past rushed)
 - 1. To do something quickly, e.g. He rushed here; Stop rushing, we will make it in time.
 - 2. To move forward quickly to attack or grab someone, e.g. The bear rushed at us.



gush

- ► verb (**gush, gushing,** *past g***ushed**)
- To flow out suddenly and in great quantity, e.g. The water gushed from the broken tap;
 The tears were gushing from his eyes.

jazz

▶ noun

• A type of music of black American origin, e.g. We went to the concert hall to hear the Jazz band play.



buzz

▶ noun

• The sound made by insects such as bees when flying, e.g. The fly

was buzzing around the room; The mosquitoes were buzzing around my face.



fuzz

noun

• A fluffy or frizzy mass of hair or fiber like the skin of a peach, or a tennis ball, e.g. Our rabbit is a ball of so we named him Fuzz-ball.



> noun

- 1. A short exam/test, e.g. Students, please prepare the chapter for a quick quiz.
- 2. A gameshow where the contestants have to give the correct answers in order to win, *e.g.* "Who Wants To Be a Millionaire?" is a popular quiz show.

bath

▶ noun

1. The act of bathing, e.g. Please take a bath! If the showers is not working, take a bucket bath.

2. A big container where one sits to wash the body,

e.g. The duck is in the bath.






▶ noun

A walkway, e.g. She was walking on the footpath; There is a path in the woods that leads to the house of the Pandavas.

2. A set of actions or choices, e.g. We have to make sure that children chose the right path in life; Taking drugs and alcohol is a path to destruction.

- ▶ proper noun
 - · A girl's name




with

- ➤ Preposition
 - 1. In company of, together, at the same time, *e.g. I go to school with my sister; come with me! Would you like some sauce with your noodles?*
 - 2. Having, using, e.g. Who is the man with the long beard? Cut the vegetables with a knife.

moth

- noun
- A small flying insect that is mostly seen during the night, similar but less colourful than a butterfly, e.g. Moths have eaten holes in my sweater; Sometimes people call naphthalene 'moth balls' because it keeps moths away.



- ► Verb (sing, singing, past sang, past part sung)
 - To make music with the voice, usually with words, e.g. She sang softly to herself; The bird sang a song that was so sweet it made us cry.

rang [past tense of ring]

- ▶ verb (ring, ringing, past rang past part rung)
- 1. A sound like a bell, e.g. The telephone is ringing, the telephone rang three times; He rang the bell to call the children for dinner.
- 2. To call on the phone, e.g. I rang you yesterday, why didn't you pick up the phone?



hang

- ► verb (hang, hanging, past hung)
- To put up or suspended something from the ground, e.g. The monkey is hanging on the branch; Hang your coat on the hook; Hang the laundry out to dry.



- ▶ noun/adjective
 - A sudden loud noise, e.g. The fireworks exploded with a loud bang; When they were building our house, we could hear banging noises all day.
- **▶** verb
 - To hit accidentally, e.g. He banged into the door; He banged into me.





gang

noun

• A group of people, usually friends, e.g. They are a nice gang; He is involved with a criminal gang; Meet my gang!



ring

▶ noun

• Something worn on the finger or toe, e.g. This is my

wedding ring; Have you seen my toe ring?

▶ verb (ring, ringing, past rang past part rung)

1. A sound like a bell, e.g. The telephone is ringing.

2. To call with the phone, e.g. I'll ring you later; Did you ring me yesterday?




sing

▶ verb (sing, singing, past sang, past part sung)

• To make music with the voice, usually with words,

e.g. The girl is singing; The birds are singing in the trees;

Please sing to me.



wing

noun

1. The part of the body that animals like birds or insects use to fly, *e.g. The bird was flapping its wings*.

- 2.The part of an airplane needed to fly, e.g. We were sitting near the wing of the plane.
- 3. A part of a building that sticks out, *e.g.* Our classroom is on the West wing.



king

noun

• The male ruler of a Country, e.g. Akbar was a king of India.



song

▶ noun

• A type of poem that is sung, e.g. Please sing a song about Krishna.





long

▶ adjective

- 1. The opposite of short, e.g She has long hair; I have been waiting a long time.
- 2. Length, e.g. This is one meter long; how long is the table?



▶ adverb

- 1. For a great period of time, e.g. I did not sleep for long; He has been away for a long time.
- 2. For a whole period of time, e.g. I worked all day long.



gong

▶ noun

• A musical instrument; a round piece of metal that makes a deep, ringing noise, e.g. The pujari was ringing the gong at the temple.

rung [past participle of ring]

verb (ring, ringing, past rang past part rung)

1. A sound like a bell, e.g. At the end of

class, the bell was rung; Have they rung the bell yet? She has rung the bell, please go to assembly.

2. To call with the phone, e.g. Has he rung you to ask about tomorrow?

▶ noun

• The horizontal section of a ladder, *e.g.* She is holding the rung of the ladder; This ladder has 8 rungs; She is holding onto the rung of the ladder.

hung

[past tense of **hang**]

- ▶ verb (hang, hanging, past hung)
 - To put up or suspended something from the ground, e.g. You don't have to hang the clothes out, he has already hung them out; Have you hung the clothes out to dry?



[past participle of **sing**]

- ► Verb (sing, singing, past sang, past part sung)
 - To make music with the voice, usually with words, e.g. Have you ever sung this song? She has sung many songs like this.





missing

- ➤ adjective
 - Not found, absent, e.g. She is missing a tooth; The puzzle is missing some pieces; My wallet is missing, I think someone stole it.
- verb

• To yearn for someone, e.g. He was missing his mother; He is

missing home.



- ► Noun
 - 1. A tooth that the dentist repairs, e.g. I have to go to the dentist to get a filling; All his teeth have fillings in them.
- 2. A substance that fills something, e.g. The filling of the cake is jam and cream.
- ➤ verb (fill, filling, past filled)
 - To make full, e.g. He filled the glass with water.







- ➤ verb (**sell, selling,** *past* **sold**)
 - To give something for money, *e.g. I am selling my bike*; *How much is he selling it for*?



[The present participle of the verb PACK]

- ► verb (pack, packing, past packed)
 - To put things together in a box, bag, etc, e.g. We are packing to go to London; Have you finished packing?
- **▶** noun
 - A soft material used to prevent articles from breaking during transport, e.g. Make sure you put enough packing in the box so that the gift will not break.







telling

- ▶ verb (tell, telling, past told)
- 1. To say something, inform, explain, speak, order, *e.g.* He is telling the truth; I keep telling them to be quiet but they don't listen; He was telling me about his brother yesterday.
 - 2. To know, judge, recognize, e.g. He is having trouble telling the difference between 'b' and 'd'.



singing

[present participle of **sing**]

- ► Verb (sing, singing, past sang, past part sung)
 - To make music with the voice, usually with words, e.g. Will you please stop singing! He was singing all night long.



[present participle of ring]

- ▶ verb (ring, ringing, past rang past part rung)
 - 1. A sound like a bell, e.g. The telephone is ringing; The bell is ringing.
 - 2. To call with the phone, *e.g.* He is ringing the doctor now.



[present participle of zap]

- ▶ verb (zap, zapping, past zapped)
- 1. To move suddenly and rapidly, *e.g.* He is zapping through the channels trying to find something good to watch.
 - 2. To destroy, e.g. He is busy zapping bugs with the spray.



[present participle of shock]


- **▶** adjective
 - 1. Causing surprise and pain,
- e.g. It was shocking news; It was shocking to hear about her accident.
 - 2. Causing disgust or anger, e.g. This is really shocking behavior!







• A game, table tennis, e.g. The boys were playing ping-pong.







ding-dong

▶ noun

• The sound made by bells ringing, e.g. Ding-dong goes the bell.

on

▶ preposition

- 1. Touching (usually on the upper side), e.g. The book is on the table; The picture of Krishna is on the wall; There is a ring on her finger; Do not walk on the grass; He stepped on my foot.
- 2. About, e.g. This is a book on Hinduism; I saw a movie on Krishna.

▶ adjective

- In action, in use, e.g. Is the light on or off?
- Taking place, occurring, e.g. There is a play on just now.

▶ adverb

- Indicating something still happening, e.g. Go on with your work.
- Indicating contact, e.g. He had his hat on; He had no clothes on.

off

▶ preposition

• Not on, away, e.g. He jumped off the roof; Keep off the grass!

▶ adjective

• Not in action, not in use, e.g. Is the light on or off?
